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

P5 Inter-disciplinary Project Work (IPW)

Frontier Primary School strongly believes that Inter-disciplinary Project Work (IPW) is an important learning experience which provides students with the opportunity to synthesise knowledge from various areas of learning, and critically and creatively apply it to real life situations.

This process, which enhances students' knowledge and enables them to acquire skills like collaboration, communication and independent learning, prepares them for lifelong learning and the challenges ahead.

The Primary 5 IPW will be implemented in Term 1 Week 10 (8 to 11 March). During these four days, the timetable will be suspended for our P5 students as they will be actively engaged in group work and presentation.

Our students will take on the role as 'Young Explorers' to plan a 2-day itinerary to bring their parents to rediscover Singapore on a weekend during the June school holidays. They will carry out an interview session with their parents to better understand their preference. We hope that the parents will make time for this short activity to take place. The school will leverage the SLS platform to extend students' learning so that they can reflect on their experiences using some of the interactive thinking tools.

Applied Learning Programme (ALP): Maker@Frontier

Frontier Primary School is committed to developing **communication**, **creative and innovative thinking skills** in our students. Maker@Frontier is one of the school's Applied Learning Programme (ALP) programmes for Frontierers to **design**, **experiment and invent** through Maker activities and experiences.

The iMaker Lab is conceptualised and designed based on two guiding principles – Mobility and Flexibility. Students have been scheduled to visit the iMaker Lab for the various Maker experiences designed by the ALP team.

The iMaker Lab Induction Programme has begun with our Primary 3 students since January this year. Besides understanding the safety rules and expectations in the iMaker Lab, the lower, middle and upper primary students will be creating an art piece, a parachute and a boat respectively using materials such as plastic bags, recycled cups, strings and pipe cleaners.

Through this introductory Maker activity, Frontierers will learn the importance of exploration and problem solving. They will be able to build their character and relationships with others via enabling positive interactions. Maker experiences will also be infused in our Primary 3 and 4 Inter-disciplinary Project Work (IPW) and recess activities. Do look forward to them!

Digital Defence


Singapore commemorates Total Defence Day on 15 February every year. Digital Defence is a new pillar that has been added as one of the six pillars to Total Defence since 2019. Digital Defence reminds Singaporeans to continue to be vigilant and guard against threats from the digital domain. How can we put Digital Defence into action?

1) Being Secure

Practise good cybersecurity habits to safeguard your data and devices by using strong passwords and 2-factor authentication, installing anti-virus software, updating software as soon as possible, and looking out for signs of phishing.

2) Being Alert

Remain vigilant when confronted with a piece of information that aims to manipulate. Practise the S.U.R.E tips (Refer to image below) to discern if the information is reliable.

3) Being Responsible

Thirdly, be mindful when sharing information online by considering the impact of your actions on the broader community. If you doubt the reliability of the information, do not post or share it.

The Power of Words

Every parent wants the best for their children. Sometimes, in your anxiety to reach out to your children, your words and actions may not always go down well with them. How then can parents put across well-meaning intentions more constructively such that our children can reap the full effects of our intent?


Read hurting-your-child-s-learning-ability to learn some tips on how you can know your child, relate and influence him/her better.



Here are some phrases by Dr Justin Coulson, an Australian psychologist and leading parenting expert, on what not to use and how you can express the same sentiment better.

- 1. Don't say: "You're so clever." **Ask: "How did you feel when..."**Research indicates that praise leads to inferences of low ability. The best thing you can do is to turn it back on the child. For instance, you could say, "Hey, you seem really happy with that outcome. Tell me what you did to get it."
- 2. Don't say: "Because I said so." **Instead, say: "Let me tell you why this matters."**When you explain the rationale for the requests you are making, your child are far more likely to be compliant.
- 3. Don't say: "I was lousy at that." Perhaps you could offer this: "It's amazing what we can do when we try."

You can promote a growth mindset by highlighting what happens when both you put in effort and work hard at something.
